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BASL Xtra 2026 Speaker Biographies

Tuesday 28th April

Dr Richard Parker

Dr Richard Parker is a consultant hepatologist practising privately at Spire Leeds Hospital and at Leeds Teaching Hospitals NHS Trust (since 2017). He specialises in steatotic (fatty) liver disease and alcoholic liver disease.

He graduated from the University of Bristol in 2005 and completed NHS training before becoming a Member of the Royal College of Physicians in 2009. Dr Parker earned a PhD in liver and immunology research from the University of Birmingham in 2015, with interests in immunology and the relationship between metabolism and immunity.

His career includes clinical and research fellowships, visiting research scientist roles in the USA, and a biomedical health policy internship with the Academy of Medical Sciences. He previously served as a clinical lecturer in hepatology at the University of Birmingham.

Jeff Fernandez

Jeff Fernandez is currently a lead nurse for the alcohol and drug service based in the hospitals at Royal Free/Barnet and north Middlesex Trust. This covers a large area of north London, and the service aims to meet the patient's need in innovative ways.

I have an extensive experience in the drug and alcohol field nationally and have written widely on treatment and nursing approaches in this field. I have been the main author or co-author on at least 70 peer reviewed papers to date. These papers highlight the role that nurse prescribing can play in developing good and responsive care in substance misuse as well as, highlighting the important role that nurses can play in developing services. Nurses are an important resource in developing good patient friendly services and this role should be encouraged.

I am also a sub-editor for the British Journal of Mental Health nursing and peer-reviewer for British Journal of Nursing and the International Journal of Human Rights in healthcare. I do write frequently and contribute mainly to the British Journal of Mental Health and the British Journal of Nursing. Development of nursing roles and skills is my main area of interest.

Dr Ryan Buchanan



Ryan is lead for the REFLEX trial – testing the cost-effectiveness of screening for liver disease in people with type 2 diabetes. Ryan is experienced in mixed methods research in marginalised populations as well as cost effectiveness analysis, network modelling, time series analysis and complex intervention evaluation. He has recently led an NIHR funded collaboration developing patient and public representation from marginalised populations across England in liver disease research. Ryan has supervised 2 PHD students to completion and has 3 active post-doctoral students. Two have these have been awarded NIHR doctoral fellowships.

As part of his clinical roles he is BASL Service lead, clinical lead for the Wessex region viral hepatitis treatment network and leads the HELIXR programme. HELIXR is a regional NHS England funded programme to engage patients from marginalised populations with liver cancer surveillance imaging.

Bally Parekh

Bally Parekh is a UK-registered dietitian specialising in liver disease, transplant nutrition, and surgical rehabilitation. He has worked across NHS and private settings managing advanced hepatobiliary conditions, malnutrition, and frailty.

He has led post-transplant dietetic care at a major tertiary liver centre, contributed to national liver nutrition guidelines, and supports digital innovation in clinical services. In private practice, he runs Mesh Performance, providing specialist telehealth support for complex nutrition needs.

Alongside hepatology, Bally works with athletes to optimise performance and recovery, with broader expertise in prehabilitation, sarcopenia management, and multidisciplinary teaching. He also delivers training for Alcohol Change UK and lectures on the MSc Dietetics programme at Birmingham City University.

Blending evidence-based care with practical strategy, he supports patients to improve outcomes through targeted nutrition interventions.

Dr Ewan Forest

Ewan is a Consultant Physician and Hepatologist at Glasgow Royal Infirmary since 2003 and an Honorary Professor at University of Glasgow since 2019. He has got specialist interest in Alcohol-related Liver Disease and in particular the management of alcoholic hepatitis. He was the co-developer of the Glasgow Alcoholic Hepatitis Score and the Glasgow Modified Alcohol Withdrawal Score. He is also Chair of the Alcohol harms Group, Glasgow Alcohol Drugs Partnership and Hepatology Lead for NHS Research Scotland.

Graham Parsons



Graham is a pharmacist with over 35 years' experience, specialising in Substance Use Disorders and their treatment. He has worked at local, regional and national levels with organisations including the Advisory Council on the Misuse of Drugs, NICE, the Office for Health Improvement and Disparities, Turning Point and Waythrough to develop policies and initiatives improving substance use services.

He previously worked as a prescriber with the Plymouth Specialist Addiction Service and as Chief Pharmacist at Turning Point (2015–2021), and has also held specialist roles in hepatology at University Hospitals Plymouth. Graham contributed to the development of the DHSC clinical guidelines for alcohol treatment and is an experienced trainer, speaker and published author. In 2024, he was awarded Fellowship of the Royal Pharmaceutical Society. Graham is currently Director of Pharmacy at Waythrough, leading its Pharmacy and Medicines Optimisation work.

Dr Ian Rowe



Dr Rowe trained at the University of Glasgow and, following general medical training at Queens Medical Centre in Nottingham, specialised in Gastroenterology and Hepatology in Birmingham. He was awarded a Medical Research Council Research Training Fellowship in 2009 and subsequently an NIHR Clinical Lectureship at the University of Birmingham and the Liver and Hepatobiliary Unit at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital Birmingham. In 2015 he was appointed as a University Academic Fellow at the University of Leeds and Honorary Consultant at the Leeds Liver Unit. His main research interests are in improving the outcomes of patients with liver disease and those following liver transplant.
